BATHFORD SOCIETY

Peter Davenport: Batheaston ByPass and its Archaeology

The earliest finds 'merited publication and were of national significance'. It was during construction of the Batheaston Bypass that archaeological traces were noted when moving the earth. The Bath Archaeological Trust managed the subsequent salvage excavation. The project was managed by tonight's speaker and revealed and recorded important remains of a rural settlement founded around 250BC and continuing into the late Roman period and beyond.


The building of the Bypass, which opened in 1996, was highly controversial and both the construction and archaeological phases were beset by intrusive security issues. The Bypass ended at the Bathford Roundabout though there are innumerable engineers' surveys and

planning documents proposing a network of new carriageways across Bath, most of which were dropped. Peter will describe the history and background of the site, the artefacts unearthed and their present location. He will also

tell us his memories of the opposition to the project and its impact.

- a life lived to the full

at Shockerwick House on the 28 December to mark the 100th birthday of Anne Marie Rideal. Having visited her son Peter and daughter-in-law Alison who have lived in Bathford for 35 years and spending the Covid lockdowns with them, Anne Marie decided to move to Shockerwick House in 2021

Shockerwick House is a very different environment from the one in which she grew up. She is French and started life in St Quentin in northern France, where her parents ran a small café. Their accommodation included damp walls, no central heating and hot water bottles came in the form of hot bricks wrapped in newspaper. When she was 10 her father died and she and her mother managed to keep the café going with Anne Marie, who was good at maths, keeping the books. As the Germans advanced at the start of World War II, she fled with her mother, aunt and cousins, cycling first to Paris and then west to Nantes, a distance of around 334 miles. At one point the line of refugees were strafed by German planes, and Anne Marie and her family jumped into a ditch to escape; others were not so lucky many were killed, and cars burnt out. They arrived in Nantes at the same time as the Germans and so decided to cycle back home! Their café had been looted, Anne Marie's cello was gone - all that was left was the bow - but they managed to get the café up and running again. Shortages of food and fuel were alleviated by the fact that her family (on both sides) were farmers.


At the end of the war Anne Marie, who could speak German, and a cousin went to work for the French Restitution Mission in Karlsruhe. Germany, where she met and married RAF officer Eric Rideal. Eric's work meant that they

There were happy celebrations were constantly moving house, first in France and then at airfield postings across England. The birth of Peter (1950) and Mimi (1954) kept Anne Marie busy. Eric was posted to manage RAF Tengah, Singapore in 1959. Here they seized the opportunity to travel to South Vietnam and Cambodia, including memorably, to Ankor Wat. Anne Marie always enjoyed traveling and has been all over Europe as well as Russia on the Trans-Siberian railway, China, Australia, South America and the USA.

> Always being very active, Anne Marie has turned her hand to many different things from spinning, weaving, knitting and crochet to designing and making clothes including Alison's wedding dress, as well as being an excellent Bridge player. In the 1950s she attended St Martin's School of Art, studying dress making and tailoring. In the 70s she was a French secretary and learnt about the importation business, subsequently setting herself up as an agent for French ceramic tiles. Then she designed and oversaw the building of a small holiday home on Elba Italy. Unfortunately, Anne Marie suffered from increasing deafness and finally, without functional hearing, she had a cochlear implant in 2012 which has been hugely beneficial. Apparently, she is the oldest person in the UK (and possibly in the world) with a cochlear implant!

Having always enjoyed swimming, she swims weekly at Ashely Wood Farm pool with Peter and Alison, afterwards enjoying a meal of moules frites and an affogato at The Crown. Quite a life!

NEWS FROM OUR PCSO GARY WILLIAMS

Gary was keen to tell us about a new approach to Policing in Avon and Somerset called 'Project **Servator'** involving the police, businesses and the public working together to make it difficult for criminals and terrorists to operate.

It is the name given to unpredictable, highly visible police deployments, designed to disrupt a wide range of criminal activity. The tactics aim to identify and disrupt 'hostile reconnaissance' - the information gathering a criminal does when planning a criminal or terrorist act.

Each deployment is different. From varying numbers of uniformed, plain clothed or firearms officers with back-up support from police dogs, horses, CCTV operators, drones, etc.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

Gary tells us that if there is a **Project Servator** deployment in our area; don't worry, you can play a vital role by being the extra eyes and ears for the police. Report anything that doesn't feel right. Tell a police officer or member of staff immediately. Don't leave it to someone else to report it.



Not all love stories conclude happily with the words: "Reader, I married him." In St Valentine's month, revel in these subtle and imaginative depictions of love and longing and loss.


Free Love by Tessa Hadley (2023)

In 1967 Phyllis Fischer is leading a decorous, suburban life with her clever, diplomat husband and their schoolboy son and teenage daughter when she falls absolutely in flagrant love with a young man in his twenties, the son of old friends. During the dramatic repercussions of their affair

and Phyllis's desertion of her family, it is not only her desires which Hadley explores but also those of her cuckolded husband and her abandoned children. Her intellectual and sexual awakening comes at a cost, yet her fulfillment is undeniable.

Mothering Sunday by Graham Swift (2016)

It is March 30th in 1924. Swift recounts the crucial events of one day in the life of a young woman, adopting her viewpoint with moving and tender skill. Jane Fairchild, born a foundling, now a housemaid, has the day free without a mother to visit. Instead, she enjoys a passionate assignation with her secret lover and friend, Paul Sheringham, an upper-class youth, who is destined to marry another woman from his own social group. Though this momentous day ends in tragedy, it is gives Jane new strength to transcend her circumstances and grasp at life in unexpected ways.



A Farewell to Arms by Ernest Hemingway (1929)

Hemingway's elegiac novel, influenced by his own WW1 experiences, describes the impact of war on Lieutenant Frederic Henry, an American serving in the Italian Ambulance Corps who meets an English nurse, Catherine Barkley. Despite his resolution not to become involved and her grief for her dead fiancé, they form an ardent attachment and hope for a future together. Disillusioned with fighting after witnessing the chaotic Italian retreat from Caparetto (1917), Henry deserts and the couple flee to Switzerland for some idyllic months. But they have not escaped personal suffering; the story's moving ending is recounted in Hemingway's distinctive, unflinching style.



TENNYGROVE VINEYARD

A Sparkling Addition to Bathford Parish

On a south-east-facing, sunny slope across the valley from Bathford village, Ally and Rupert Walsh are hoping to turn a cinematic dream into reality with Tennygrove Vineyard. The journey began when the couple purchased Upper Shockerwick Farm, partly influenced by a casual comment from the selling agent about its potential for wine production.

For the past decade, Ally and Rupert have nurtured their dream of owning a vineyard, fuelled by an annual tradition of watching the movie 'A Good Year.' This dream found its home on **Upper Shockerwick Farm**, perched above Shockerwick House care home, perhaps returning the land to grape growing from Roman times.

After some wisdom imparted by Tony at **Mumfords Vineyard** (now returned to a wildflower meadow), they decided to take the plunge. In May 2023, Tennygrove Vineyard was planted, facing its first summer with resilience against the lovely Somerset weather – first enduring a drought and then excessive rain. The vineyard is primarily planted with chardonnay vines, complemented by pinot noir and pinot meunier,

carefully chosen to thrive in their unique limestone and clay soil.

Ally and Rupert describe themselves as enthusiastic amateurs, so have enlisted the expertise of an experienced contracted Vineyard Manager. From pruning and shoot selection to mowing and weeding, every detail is handled with precision, preserving the natural beauty and existing wild meadow landscape.

As the vines mature, the Walshes invite the community to join them on **volunteer days**, providing a hands-on experience in the vineyard's journey. All equipment, training, and lunch are provided, fostering a sense of community around the shared dream of Tennygrove.

With fair weather and a bit of pest management (cue runner ducks

and hens!) the first harvest is expected in autumn 2025, when they hope to start bottling English Sparkling, and perhaps a still rosé or white depending on the weather and the harvest.

ARE YOU A FAN OF THE BBC'S REPAIR SHOP?

If you've been fascinated by the TV programme and thought "I could do that" or wished that it was available locally and perhaps have something you'd like repaired, then the Repair Cafe scheme may be for you.

Some background - I got involved with the charity Bath Share & Repair by volunteering as a repairer at the monthly Repair Cafe they run in Corsham.

Basically, anyone can turn up with some portable item that they'd like to get repaired, and the volunteers do their best to fix them. What's remarkable is that some 70% of the things that turn up are repaired, saving unnecessary landfill waste and reducing resource consumption. It also provides a valuable service to the community and given that there is no charge (other than the cost of spares or an optional charitable donation), it provides a welcome helping hand in these cash-strapped times.

Having seen first-hand how successful the Repair Cafes are, I'd like to start a monthly Repair Cafe in Bathford and for this I'm going to need some enthusiastic volunteers who can spare a few hours on a Saturday morning once a month to help out. First and foremost, we need organisers (to meet & greet users and direct them to a repairer with appropriate skills) and then of course repairers (to actually do the repairs).

WHAT KIND OF SKILLS ARE WE LOOKING FOR?

Typically, administration/organisation, electrical, electronic, computers, mechanical, joinery, general & sewing but don't be put off if you have some other marvellous skill that we haven't thought of or you'd just like to learn how to fix something from one of the other repairers. There is also the potential to run a 'how to' session for small groups e.g. replace a watch battery, grow & pot seedlings, learn to solder or replace a zipper.

Repairing things is immensely rewarding - users are very grateful and often fascinated to see the internals of something that they take for granted. Plus, you get to meet all sorts of interesting people and the Repair Cafe volunteers are a very friendly bunch.

WARLEIGH AND SHOCKERWICK

TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

There has been a recent spate of accidents in the Parish over the Christmas and New Year period. The recent inclement weather has had a detrimental effect on driving conditions, but this only serves to amplify the need for greater efforts to enhance speed limit enforcement and to reduce driving speed limits throughout the Parish. The Council is continually working with BANES Highways to have infrastructure installed.

OSTLINGS LANE CLOSURE

The heavy downpours have resulted in Wessex Water discharging sewage into the Avon through storm overflows - designed to act as relief valves when the sewerage system is at risk of being overwhelmed when a lot of rainwater runs into drains and the sewerage system in a short space of time. The exploratory works at the bottom of Ostlings Lane are preparatory for building an underground reservoir to hold the excess rainwater during downpours and reduce the sewage overflows into the Avon from 68 occasions last year to a target of 10 in the future.

TREE CUTTING

BANES has been informed of the need for cutting back trees growing across the Footbridge at By Brook and along Ashley Road on the section past the farm developments.

D-DAY 80TH ANNIVERSARY

June 6, 2024, marks the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings by allied forces in Normandy that changed the fortunes of World War II. The Council feels that it is an anniversary worth marking by the Parish.
