

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# Remembering JEAN VESEY AND ERIC GREEN OF DOVERS PARK

In our May Bulletin, we announced the deaths of Jean Vesey and her partner Eric Green.

Both lived in Bathford for many decades and, being a very popular and well-known couple, we would like to celebrate their lives and their contribution to village life.

Originally from Cheshire, Jean married and moved south in 1970 when her husband, Bob, took a job with Avon Polymers. They bought a house in Dovers Park which had been Jean's home ever since. First and foremost an amazing mum, Jean worked whilst bringing up a family of four, including jobs with Directory Enquiries, the Milk Marketing Board (collecting milk samples from local farms) and Ladbrokes in Snow Hill as a cashier using her astounding mental arithmetic! After retirement, she had a rewarding role in Witness Support and was an active Parish Councillor; many may remember her campaigning against closure of the Tyndale **Nursing Home.** Passionate for supporting the underdog, Jean weaved her way through life generously guiding, helping and inspiring many, always looking forward and embracing change. Following Bob's death, Jean and Eric met by chance during a football match that blossomed into a lifelong romance. Already retired when he moved to Bathford in 1995, Eric took up many roles to help with the smooth running of the village. Being a retired Police Detective (see photo of Eric as a "bobby" in Lancashire) with that 'air of authority', he had a keen interest in keeping the village safe and along with Jean, was a Neighbourhood Watch volunteer. Other roles included a stint as a paperboy and donning his hi viz as a litter picker. Eric most enjoyed his regular shift at the Village **Shop** and the Shop was able to return the favour when his mobility became challenging, regularly delivering groceries including his favourite sweets, chocolate éclairs. Eric loved travel ('have bus pass will travel' became his motto) and sport (a Burnley supporter) with a top jockey as a grandson Paul Hanagan).

Both Jean and Eric were very special people with lots of friends in the village. They loved living here in Bathford, and we are grateful for and will miss the support that they have offered down the years.

# BEFA (Bathford Enterprise for All)

PART OF A WORLD-WIDE MOVEMENT



"What is BEFA?" seems to be a common question these days. **Bathford Enterprise for All** is the name of the co-operative which is your village Shop. "I didn't know the Shop is a co-operative" is often the follow-on comment. And then sometimes the next question is "what does being a co-operative actually mean?"

Well, in our Shop's case, it's a group of people who have voluntarily come together to provide a much-needed (and now much-loved) Shop for our village. Without this group of people, we wouldn't have a Shop as the village simply isn't big enough to support a fully commercial retail enterprise. "Aha!" I hear you say. "That's why the Shop is full of amazing volunteers!" Yes — exactly! The Shop has 70+ active volunteers working to serve the community, without whom the Shop couldn't stay open.

If you live in Bathford you can buy a share in the Shop which will make you a member of the BEFA co-operative, and you can have a say in what the Shop gets up to. And, you should also consider volunteering. If you would like to keep the Shop in the village, then please offer to help. It's more than just 'use it or lose it' – it's 'help it or lose it'! So if you're not a BEFA member, or a volunteer in the Shop – why not?

So, did you realise that BEFA is one of 3 million co-ops around the world -7000 of them being in the UK - that have around 1.2 billion members? We are not unique but share our different ways of doing business with co-ops in pretty much every industry all over the globe – from healthcare to housing, renewable energy to retail and sports to social care and Credit Unions. And they are every shape and size from multi-billion-pound businesses to small community enterprises such as BEFA. Members can be the customers, employees, residents or suppliers.

All co-ops are Member owned and controlled, driven by values, not just profit. Members decide democratically, with each Member having one vote. No matter the type of Co-op. all have the same enterprise model based on globally agreed principles that rest on a foundation of shared ethical values. Profits generated are either reinvested in the enterprise, returned to the Members or used to enhance the communities they serve.

2024 is the 180th anniversary of what is commonly known as the 'birth' of the Cooperative Movement; the opening up of the first co-operative shop in Toad Lane, Rochdale in 1844, which was set up by local people to meet a social need, just like BEFA has.

Since 1923, every year at the beginning of July, co-operatives around the world come together and celebrate the International Day of Co-operatives. We hope we can play our part in that celebration this year. Watch out in the Shop nearer the time, and don't forget – become a Member, or volunteer some of your time. Or maybe even both!

#### AROUND THE GARDEN

Oh, the agony, the mental torture! There I was, ready to pile loads of stuff onto the component heap, but when

stuff onto the compost heap, but when I pulled back the cover, there they were, the things that I am most pleased to see in the garden but haven't for a few years now - slow worms. So, what's the problem? Well, when I load the compost

heap, I usually start slicing down on it with a spade, chopping the material and compacting the heap, to help speed up the rotting process. But not when there are slow worms lying across the top. I don't want lots of bits of slow worm scattered through the heap – how would it look at the Flower Show if there was the head of a legless lizard peering back at you from my sample? (You mean you didn't know that compost is a category in the Flower Show? Tut, tut). So, I'll just have to risk

looking a little bit silly, gently and delicately layering **rhubarb leaves** and **grass cuttings** and all the other garden waste onto a pile of rotting garden matter, without disturbing my visitors.

Luckily there's always something in the garden that makes up for these small annoyances. For example, another odd thing has occurred. There is a rambling rose doing very well at the back of the garage that fills that corner with fragrance later in summer. But one of the stems has found its way into the greenhouse through a window that doesn't close properly. And of course, that one stem has benefitted enormously from the conditions inside its new shelter. So now I have rose blossoming inside the greenhouse, giving off its scent, while outside the rest of the plant is covered

waiting for summer.

with buds, all still tightly furled,

Ever wondered what happens to the garden waste collected by the Council? The answer is revealed in one of BANES' marketing messages – the garden waste is taken to two local farms, one in Yate and the other near Wells, where it is composted under controlled conditions to produce a compost that meets the leading industry accreditation for compost quality. It is then offered back to BANES' residents in the Reuse Shop at the Keynsham Reuse and Recycling Centre for £4 per 40-litre bag. The shop is open Tuesday to Friday 09:00 to 15:30 and Saturday 09:30 to 15:00. This is a bit of a drive from Bathford but well worth thinking about if you are ever in Keynsham.

#### **BATHFORD SOCIETY**

#### Review of talk by Richard Irving: Combe Down stone mines

Being neighbours of the Combe Down stone mines, most of us in the large audience knew something about them. Richard, who is **President** of the Combe Down Heritage Society and has written on the subject, framed his talk in terms of three historical figures, two of whom were financially successful, and one of whom, though distinguished in his own right, came a financial cropper. Ralph Allen (who we all knew), rich from his successful launch of the postal service, grew richer in his development of the stone mines, Prior Park being only part of his legacy. He and all the other quarry masters had the advantage of a stone which, when freshly mined was soft and easily cut to shape, but when left outside, hardened and could be used for building. The second character,

Philip Nowell, an outstanding master stone mason, enriched himself on the extensions of Longleat House, then amongst others, Windsor Castle and Apsley House, the home of the Duke of Wellington. Finally, there was William Smith, the father of English geology who produced the first geological map of Great Britain. He bought himself a quarry, and at the side of the Somerset Coal Canal (which connected to the Kennet and Avon), developed a machine for the simultaneous cutting of stone. He fell victim to economic recession and indirectly, the influence of Luddism, and was financially ruined. At the end we knew so much more about this fascinating history and about the art of quarrying.

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# BATHFORD PARISH —— COUNCIL ——

Notes from the Annual Parish Meeting 14 May 2024

A modest number of residents attended this year's Annual Parish Meeting.

Reports were available to read from the Council Committees prior to the start and there was a display of the development of the **Bathford Bulletin since 2020**, showing its transformation to the wonderful magazine you read today.

Council Chair Hillary Carr welcomed the ensemble, introduced the Councillors over the last 12 months and then the guest speakers for the evening:

- Sarah Warren, BANES Deputy Head and Ward Councillor
- Jessica Fox-Taylor BANES Sustainable Transport
- Jill Gigg Bathford Link
- Sue Costello and Emma Jackson Bathford Players
- Jamie Feilden Jamie's Farm



Sarah gave an overview of the Local Plan to build 8,000 homes in the BANES area between now and 2040 and the potential impact for the Bathford

area. She then gave us details on the success of the Clean Air Zone initiative in Bath that has successfully seen a reduction of 26% in annual mean nitrogen dioxide (NO2) within the zone and a reduction of 27% in the urban area outside the zone.

And Sarah finished on the current policies and initiatives being taken to address the **Climate Emergency**.

Jessica Fox-Taylor gave extensive details on the programme by BANES to extend the current distribution of Tier electric bikes



and scooters throughout the region and up to Bathford, likely by September 2024.

Jill Gigg made a representation for more co-ordinators and drivers on behalf of Link, the local organisation founded to provide transportation for anyone requiring assistance to attend medical appointments.

Jamie Feilden grew up in Warleigh, attended Bathford Primary School and developed a love for farming and wildlife before moving to London and becoming a teacher. It was there that he worked with vulnerable/ challenged children which put him on the path to establishing a charity with a desire to improve wellbeing and mental health. This is done through the process of 'farming family therapy' that includes lots of fresh air, lots of jobs that bring real satisfaction and really boosts children's self-esteem.

#### RIGHT ME HEARTIES!

A pirate and a witch made an appearance at the Annual Parish Meeting last month!
Bathford Players members
Emma Jackson and Sue Costello gave the audience an entertaining update and left us with a couple of pleas.

Sue as the pirate had a motive to pressgang "a few o' you souls into joining us!"

We learned that the Players had been running "a mighty fine ship" out of the Parish Hall since 1965 and they would like to continue to do so, but they need a bit of help.

It is remarkable that the Players as the village amateur dramatic group, has been in existence for 59 years, staging 105 productions and entertaining over 35,000 people (though some of them may have come twice!).

As a general rule, there is a pantomime in February and a play in October; they've done everything from Cinderella to Dad's Army, and Peter Pan to Passion Plays.

They have been told that they offer the best value family pantomime in the area and people love (or moan) at the local jokes and laugh at seeing people they know dressed up in costume. "The pantos are a lovely February tradition and the best therapy any village could have against loneliness and isolation in winter!"

The pantomimes are often the first time children see a live performance and they love it when they can join the players on stage. Acting gives them confidence; they might start off as a little animal in Wind in the Willows, grow up to become one of Peter Pan's lost boys or even end up as the lead in Cinderella!

Putting on a play is a group effort, with people of all ages and generations - on stage, backstage, directing, on the bar, serving tea and coffee, costume making, set painting and setting up the stage. Since Covid, and maybe Netflix(!), numbers of

active participants have dwindled and the Players are actively seeking directors, committee members (especially a treasurer) and anyone willing to join in in any way, no experience necessary!

So, whether you are seven or seventy, they hope you will join them. You are promised a warm welcome.

The second plea relates to equipment - one of the perennial challenges has been the stage. The current lovingly crafted stage blocks need six people, two days and carpentry skills to build the stage. This effort has been overcome in recent times by hiring a lightweight one, put up in 1.5 hours with safety rails, but it came at a cost, and it ate up the profit. The last two productions were well received, but both made a loss.

#### The Whalebone Theatre by Joanna Quinn (2022)

Life at Chilcombe is often extraordinary. Christabel Seagrave, growing up on the Dorset coast alongside her two step siblings, finds a beached whale. Inspired by their beloved storybooks and an émigré Russian artist, the children create a theatre inside the whale's enormous skeleton to stage magical summer productions, which continue until they reach adulthood. But in 1939, the war brings them sterner parts to play: Christabel and Digby see action in France as secret agents and

Flossie joins the Land Army. Facing separation, they continue to cherish their special bond. Will it survive?


#### A View of the Harbour by Elizabeth Taylor (1947)

This Elizabeth Taylor is not the Hollywood screen goddess, but a distinguished writer admired by her 20th century contemporaries. Here she is concerned with the nuances of everyday life in a small, shabby, harbour town. Bertram has come to Newby to paint, and through him we meet the different residents, who all have a view of the harbour and of one another too. With warmth and wit, Taylor explores their inner lives, their emotional entanglements, sometimes their loneliness. When Bertram hangs his finished painting on the bar wall, the landlord declares: "Interesting what two people can make of the same view. We all see places a bit different to what the next man does."



Who has been murdered in Lower Lockwood and who is the killer? Two Law students must re-examine the facts of the crime to prevent a miscarriage of justice. Through the detailed evidence of e-mails, text messages, notes and newspaper cuttings, the reader can also solve this mystery. The documentation reveals the complicated relationships between members of an amateur theatre group, the Fairway Players, who are staging a production of Miller's All My Sons. The group is raising funds for Poppy's Appeal to buy expensive cancer treatment for the infant granddaughter of the Haywards, but not everyone trusts the process. A murderous power struggle reaches its climax after the disastrous dress rehearsal.
