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BATHFORD SOCIETY

Claverton, our near neighbour. Talk by Glennis Naylor

Monday 28 October, 19:30 for 20:00 in Bathford Parish Hall.

Claverton is a small village of just over 100 people with more than its share of history. It was part of the Anglo-Saxon Hundreds of Hampton and operated under the Frankpledge system of collective responsibility. Its parish church has a Norman Tower and a seventeenth century peal of bells. The old manor house, now rebuilt as the American Museum, was besieged and captured by a parliamentarian force in the civil war.

Glennis Naylor is a Claverton Parish Councillor and local historian and will guide us through the history, including the pumping station and contentious weir, and introduce us to a few earlier residents on the way.

ASK THE TRAINER Your questions answered by

Ali Creighton at Doodle Dogs Training

Q: HOW CAN I HELP MY DOG COPE • DO Make sure collar tag and microchip

Fear of fireworks, gunshots and thunder is common among dogs and they may have developed this fear before you get them. Fear is a survival response and creates strong reactions that are hard to change but they can be modified over time, with work. Teaching a new puppy that loud noises are OK is easier. For example, if, the first time your puppy hears fireworks, they are immediately showered with their favourite food they'll probably form a positive impression of fireworks! (This approach would need continued reinforcement). Starting cautiously and building resilience is the way to go.

If your dog is already afraid, you'll probably need many months to adjust their perception. Using a soundtrack like Dogs Trust's 'Sounds Scary,' together with their detailed instructions, is one way to gradually accustom your dog to the noises.

Here are some dos regarding fireworks:

- **DO** Behave normally with your usual routine your dog learns from you.
- **DO** Stay at home if fireworks are happening.
- **DO** Be there for your dog, if they want to stay close to you.
- **DO** Make a 'safe space' for your dog to get used to e.g. a blanket over their crate or a bed under a table with toys and treats.
- DO Keep your dog inside with doors and gates closed.

 DO Make sure collar tag and microchip details are up to date – in case they escape.

- DO Exercise your dog physically and mentally during the day so they are tired.
- **DO** Provide blankets, toys, chews, 'Kong's' or puzzle feeders to occupy them.
- **DO** Speak to your Vet well in advance as medication may be appropriate.
- **DO** Close the curtains and put on the TV, radio or some music.
- **DO** Get ready for next year with Dogs Trust's 'Sounds Scary.'
- ... and here are some dont's:
- DON'T Panic! If you behave strangely, your dog will assume something is wrong.
- DON'T Overly 'reassure' your dog you're conveying something's wrong.
- DON'T Ignore your dog particularly if they are scared.
- DON'T Let your dog outside because you think they're coping – it could be too much.
- **DON'T** Expose your dog to fireworks so they 'get used to them' you're more likely to get the opposite effect.

MONKTON FARLEIGH MINES

From mines to munitions to data storage – Hillary Carr investigated.

The recent 80th anniversary of D-Day served

as a reminder of how vital the role played by

the mines at Monkton Farleigh was, being the

world's largest ammunition depot in its time

during WWII.

So, with my curiosity piqued, I was kindly offered the opportunity to have a guided tour of the corridors that served the allied invasion in 1944, and which has since been converted to a data storage depot by Restore[®].

My guide, the Assistant Mines Manager, Mark Ward started with a history lesson:

> The mines were excavated around 100 years ago for the oolitic limestone that constitutes Bath Stone. When mining finished, they were used for storage until the War Office purchased the site in 1936 and created the ammunition store which operated 24/7 during the invasion of Normandy. It was decommissioned in 1965 and sold off in 1976. Restore® purchased the site in 2008 for use as a data storage site.

On acquisition, Restore[®] set about adding modern technology to make the depot suitable for underground data storage by adding 58 dehumidifiers which draw in superheated air through shafts. This keeps the temperature

at a steady 20 degrees and at a humidity of 65 to 70 percent. Restore® have recently commissioned WIFI throughout, taking 9 months to lay 21 miles of cabling.

The site covers a vast underground terrain of some 63 acres (or 40 football pitches)! After descending 109 steps you reach the main corridor, a quarter mile in length, off which run

districts 12 to 19. Another corridor, a half mile in length leads to a ten acre area, district 20.

There's a constant hum in the corridors and the sound increases as motorised vehicles dart along corridors and districts dropping off or picking up the many storage boxes that line the corridors ready for recycling. (A minimum of three lorry loads of boxes are shredded each week).

I marvelled at the huge feat of engineering back in the original days of mining and how the site must have operated during WWII and wished I could have been transported back in time! What is it like to be world famous? Or to be so notorious you must flee retribution? How does a single young woman in Georgian England become a celebrated novelist? This month's writers investigate the real lives of their leading characters with brilliant attention to era and setting.

ONE TWO THREE FOUR: THE BEATLES IN TIME BY CRAIG BROWN (2020)

Brown won the Baillie Gifford Prize with this highly original biography of the Fab Four. Through interviews, diaries, letters, and charts, he tells of the group's formation, their meteoric rise

to fame and eventual dissolution. With a relish for bizarre details, he provides fascinating anecdotes about their 1960's contemporaries. Despite this witty approach, he does not ignore the toll that being a Beatle took on each of them: "crushed by the weight of the world's adulation."

ACT OF OBLIVION BY ROBERT HARRIS (2022)

In 1660 a dramatic manhunt begins. Oliver Cromwell is dead, and the restored King Charles II seeks to punish those who executed his father. Two of the regicides, Colonels Whalley and Goffe, flee to New England, but the Royalist Richard Nayler intends to find them. Whilst their fellow regicides receive gruesome punishment in London, the fugitives face the constant threat of capture in the American wilderness. Harris does not take sides in this bitter conflict between old enemies; he is expert in presenting the suspense of the chase as the hunter pursues his quarry with obsessive fervour.

LETTERS TO ALICE BY FAY WELDON (1984)

Alice is eighteen, she has dyed her hair green to annoy her mother and complains that

studying Jane Austen's novels is irrelevant and boring. Her aunt, an established author, resolves to change her niece's mind. In a series of affectionate letters, she urges Alice "to read before it's too late." She explores the limited circumstances of Austen's life ("by your standards it was a horrible time to be alive"), yet also celebrates the wonderful timelessness of her genius. The whole correspondence is a glorious, playful romp to show the teenager the joy of studying books. In fact, Alice writes her first novel after receiving her aunt's advice, just as Austen's own niece did.

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Iqbal Suleman

In our September Bulletin, we announced the death of Iqbal Suleman (husband of Masuma and father to Salim and Sabeena and grandchildren Aydan, Lylah, Lena and Zakary). Below is a little about his life:

In 1962, at age 16, Iqbal, a British citizen, moved to the UK from Jinja, Uganda to study. He trained and worked as a radiographer at the RUH where he met his beloved Masuma, and they married in 1974.

They established their family business as Bathford's Newsagents and Post Office in 1984, moving the shop from Church Street to the former 'New Inn' on Bathford Hill in 1993. Iqbal worked 7 days a week, and quickly became a central figure in Bathford.

Iqbal was dedicated to his family. He instilled a strong work ethic and sense of learning, never one to miss a school event or academic achievement and passing on the love of studying to his four grandchildren.

Around 2006, Iqbal and Masuma started to retire from the business. The shop continued as a cooperative and Iqbal fully retired from the Post Office in August 2008, although he continued volunteering in the shop for many years.

Iqbal and Masuma's life remained above the village shop where many used to comment on the love and sounds from their grandchildren, who would often visit. Their retirement was spent dedicated to nurturing them and travelling the world.

Iqbal loved the Bathford community, and his family are very grateful for the many kind words, cards, flowers and support.

He will be greatly missed.

Bertie Marshall 1926 - 2024

Bertie lived in Bathford for over 50 years and was married to Cyril, a former Head of Bathford School. She was an active member of various community groups including Mothers Union, the Church Sunday School and ran 'Teddy Bears,' a fun group for young children. Bertie taught at Bathampton School for many years, and, as a non-driver, always walked across the fields whatever the weather. She especially loved the fact that she would get to know some of the children whose parents she had taught! After retirement, she was a regular in the shop, going for lunch and a catch-up with her many local friends.

Bertie had six children, seventeen grandchildren and twenty six great grandchildren of whom she was very proud.

Just as we conducted the **2022 Road Safety Survey**, we would look initially to conduct a survey - online and paper-based. Analysis of the results would then determine where there are common threads and we could invite those supporters/volunteers to develop the projects further in working parties. The proposals would include a study of the risks and benefits and overall feasibility, together with an assessment of the community feel for the proposal – positive, negative or ambivalent.
