



Tucked away on Gay Street, Bath, is a veritable Aladdin's cave of board and card games. As this sociable hobby grows ever more popular, particularly with tech-fatigued young people, Thirsty Meeples board game café provides a wonderful space to give it a go.

For those overwhelmed by choice, their well-informed 'Game Gurus' are on hand to help. Not only can they suggest games to match your interests, but they can also give you a summary of the rules, making it easier to learn the ropes. Food and drink are decent. From previous experience the sandwiches

can be a little expensive (above £5), so I avoided them during my recent visit, but they did have delicious cake! Ultimately, though, the café's speciality is the entertainment not the victuals.

If you want to bring the fun home with you, there's also a well-stocked **shop**, where various games are available to buy.

It would be particularly suitable for young people hoping for a novel meetup idea, or as a family outing with older children. The cover charge is £9 pp for three hours, though this lowers to £7 (£6 for children) when ordering food.

### **TOGETHER WE STAND**

Bulletin readers may remember reading about the work of Bathford resident Zhenya Shkil, and her efforts to improve the lives of those affected by the Russian aggression in Ukraine.

Born and brought up in Kyiv, she has been working relentlessly to find ways to provide aid. She spearheaded a friendship link, backed by B&NES Council, between Bath and the Ukrainian town of Oleksandriya and founded the charitable support

organisation, Friends of Oleksandriya.

She believed that an area like B&NES so many among us who give their time and effort to improve could provide more tangible help by people's lives, in both a voluntary and professional capacity. focussing on a small area in Ukraine to This month, we have selected two examples of selfless make a real difference for its residents. dedication and who reflect the kindred spirit that Through the charity, she has successfully organised and supported numerous fundraising and charitable activities to buy items such as generators and an ambulance. One innovative idea has involved the successful fundraiser for a school bus with B&NES residents sponsoring seats, as well as annual concerts in Bath Abbey, sharing the culture of Ukraine with the help of Ukrainian and

Zhenya has continued to shine a beacon of hope for those in need, most recently with a "Wrapathon" in November, which involved over 200 volunteers. In the phenomenal effort over one day, the team wrapped over 5000 Christmas presents for disadvantaged children in Oleksandriya.

Zhenya tells us, "The overwhelming support by the residents of Bath and North Fast Somerset for all of our activities, shows how much care and compassion they have".

### HOPE AND HOMES FOR CHILDREN

Keith and Julia Masdin have been fundraising for Hope and Homes for Children for more than 25 years; with their unrelenting energy, Bathford has been at the forefront in remarkably raising almost £500,000!

Few residents in the Parish can have missed participating For our third look at what constitutes our communal heartbeat. in the huge number of events that Keith and Julia have organised since 1997, building a great sense of we felt that we should reflect outwards and look at the work of community. These have included auctions of promises, coffee mornings, wine tastings, treasure hunts, garden parties, and talks from high profile guests such as Kate Adie and Olympian, Katherine Grainger. They also organised a sponsored cycle ride from Bath to our twin village in Artannessur-Indre! Keith tells us that so many Bathford residents have helped them over the years, that naming them would have to come in a separate volume!

> The Salisbury-based charity is run by both aid employees and many volunteers countrywide. It celebrated

its 30th anniversary in 2024, the details. having been founded by Colonel Mark Cook, a retired British Army officer, who had witnessed firsthand the plight of a group of children struggling to survive in Sarajevo's main orphanage at the height of the Bosnian War. Immediately on his retirement, Mark and his wife Caroline revisited the city to see how they could help. After shelling. the building was in a terrible state; the children were left to scavenge for food and supplies and the babies were crammed in a basement room. Mark and Caroline wanted to give the children and those like them hope, hence founding and naming the charity 'Hope and Homes for Children'. They work alongside local partners, governments and civil society organisations in over 30 countries to dismantle orphanagebased care systems

> Keith and Julia would like their work to continue for the next 25 years and be as successful. They invite everyone to participate in activities; look out for the guiz that is currently available in the Shop and the regular second-hand books sales. Larger fund-raising activities need more input and Julia and Keith make a plea to anyone willing to get involved to make contact.

### TENNYGROVE VINEYARD

Looking Ahead in 2025

It was a busy second year here at Tennygrove Vineyard, perched on the hill above Bathford in Upper Shockerwick.

We started 2024 with one of the key tasks for any vineyard – pruning. This important job helps keep the vines healthy and sets us up for the growing season ahead. Once the vines were pruned, we moved on to bud selection, carefully choosing the strongest buds to ensure a strong trunk for future growth. Although we didn't see any flowers develop into grapes last year, we're optimistic for the future and looking forward to our first flowering and grape harvest in 2025. We know the journey from vine to wine takes time and we're excited for what's ahead.

Last year, we had some help from our flock of runner ducks. They were busy keeping the slugs and snails under control, which was particularly helpful during what was a very wet year. They were important in maintaining a healthy balance in the vineyard, all while reducing our reliance on chemicals.

Living in the parish but across the valley from the village, we are grateful for the support we've received from our local community, and we are looking forward to sharing more of our progress in the months to come. The road to growing good grapes is a long one and we can't wait to share the results this year.

We hope to be open to visitors sometime this year and, fingers crossed, have some Tennygrove Vineyard Somerset wine to enjoy. Do follow us on Instagram (@tennygrove\_vineyard) for updates and more news on our vineyard journey. Thank you for your continued support – we look forward to what's next!

### BATHFORD SOCIETY

Preview: Talk on the Balance between Preservation and Development

Mon 24 February, 19:30 for 20:00 at Bathford Parish Hall

Do you live in a listed building? If so, the next talk to the Bathford Society could be for you. The talk is being given by Alex Sherman, Chief Executive, Bath Preservation Trust (BPT). BPT reviews all planning applications and development proposals for Bath and its environs every year and responds to those which may have a major impact to the integrity and World Heritage status of the city. BPT also provides informed planning advice to

homeowners of historic houses and listed buildings. Giving an example from Bathford, Alex will explain how the Trust balances the need to preserve the unique features of our beautiful city without inhibiting its development in an environment which is both economically and technically demanding.

### **ASK THE TRAINER**

Your questions answered by Ali Creighton at Doodle Dogs Training



Q When and how should I socialise my puppy?

Socialisation, strictly speaking, is a developmental stage which lasts roughly between 4 and 14 weeks so it's already underway when you bring your puppy home. It is nature's way of preparing puppies for adult life and has huge implications for their future behaviour and emotional stability. It is a critical time for your puppy to learn about the world, without which they can suffer from unnecessary fear and anxiety, causing negative reactions.

Expose your puppy gently and positively to as many sights, sounds and smells as you can to build resilience, confidence and optimism. Start at home, then graduate to the wider world. Carry your puppy or use a pushchair until vaccinations are complete but don't let your puppy get overwhelmed (especially by everyone who wants to meet and cuddle them!)

Write a checklist of everything your puppy is likely to encounter e.g. adults, children, babies, people with hats/helmets/sticks etc., then start introductions at your puppy's pace, ensuring they feel safe at all times. If rushed, you could create lifelong fears for your puppy so take it slowly. Introductions to other dogs needn't start with touch. Your puppy can see, hear and smell another dog from a distance without risking getting scared. If they look happy, reduce the distance but do

this gradually, watching their reaction. A two second nose touch then a break is ideal. Don't use a 'sink or swim' approach – what if they sink? You are trying to build your puppy up, not break them. Remember, you can't go too slowly but you can go too fast.

### Annual budget precept 2025/26

One of the Parish Council's duties is the responsible financial management of the administration and maintenance of our local facilities and services for the community.

Every February the Parish Council determines and submits to BANES the budget for the forthcoming fiscal year. This includes the precept – the amount that we ask residents to contribute to their Council Tax to make up the requisite funding. The precept funds are spent solely within Bathford parish, for the benefit of residents.

The Council has passed a precept for 2025/26 with an increase of less than seven percent on the previous figure. Although mindful of the increasing cost of living and the need to keep costs down, the Council is unfortunately faced with increases in certain unavoidable costs in the next financial year. These include the inflationary costs incurred on our village maintenance and the statutory requirement to start paying employer NI contributions on the Clerk's salary. In cash terms, this represents an increase of £0.04 a week for a household in a Band D property. To find out more, please contact the Clerk at clerk@bathford.net.
