

#### **ASK THE TRAINER**

Your questions answered by Ali Creighton at Doodle Dogs Training

Q. What rules affect me taking my dog on holiday?

A. None for Great Britain!

However, Brexit complicated things and rules do apply to all dogs (including assistance dogs) travelling to the EU or NI. First off, you'll need an Animal Health Certificate (AHC) or a Pet Passport. Official veterinarians issue AHCs (at a cost) and your dog (over 12 weeks old) needs a rabies vaccination 21 days before travel and a microchip. AHCs are valid for 10 days to enter the EU/NI and for 4 months onward travel within the EU and return to Great Britain (GB). A new AHC is needed for every trip. Additionally, tapeworm treatment (time limits apply) is needed for travel to Finland, Ireland, NI, Malta or Norway. Pet Passports issued in GB no longer work but passports from NI and some other countries do.

Travelling home requires the use of certain routes, certain carriers, a 'non-commercial declaration' and having all other paperwork and vaccinations correct. There are different rules for different countries and individual carriers have individual rules. Dogs may have to stay on the car deck of **ferries** or in the **hold of aeroplanes**, so consider separation anxiety. Check the fine details and country specifics thoroughly before you travel because errors in paperwork could see your pet stranded at home or abroad. Muzzle training may be required so check your breed/country combination e.g. Staffies must be muzzled in public in Germany and technically, all dogs should be muzzled in public in Italy. Take time to gently muzzle train your dog well before you travel.

Bathford Mill through the ages and today

It is a strange thought that Bathford Mill was mentioned in the Domesday Book, and it is still flourishing today. Through the years it has been used to process corn and as a fulling mill for wool. Somehow or other it migrated to making security paper which required China clay that had to be brought from Cornwall. The Bathford Paper Mill is one of the very few factories in the world that are able to produce the high-quality paper required for security documents such as passports. These papers feature high quality watermarks and hidden security features that are impossible to counterfeit. As their products are used to verify citizen identity, the site also maintains high levels of physical security.

We saw a video of the factory in the 1930s with wonderful steam lorries, which contrast with the works today that look space-age.

Bathford before the NHS, presented by John Daniels, Author.

The NHS, with its many limitations, aims in theory to provide healthcare from cradle to grave and probably in Bathford with our local providers we do better than most. However, what happened before the NHS when Government was effectively absent from the scene? In this talk, John Daniels who has researched the topic, will tell us of the Bath Hospital Box scheme. This was a voluntary subscription scheme in which Bathford, one of over 80 local wards in Bath, West Wilts and North Somerset, set up a local committee to collect guarterly contributions from home collecting boxes. Initially established to rescue the Royal United Hospital from debt and closure (under the chairmanship of Frank Pine, the grandfather of John), the scheme expanded to cover a wide range of benefits including dentistry and spectacles.

#### **EVERY PANCAKE TELLS A STORY!**

#### Who doesn't look forward to Shrove Tuesday to enjoy a pancake treat?

Shrove Tuesday, or Pancake Day, is an important part of the Christian calendar, but why do we eat pancakes on Shrove Tuesday?

Christians believe that the **40 days before Easter** (called Lent) marks the time that Jesus spent fasting in the desert. Traditionally, this time was spent praying and fasting, which meant not eating rich foods including meat, eggs, fats and milk. Before Lent could begin, all of these foods needed to be removed from the house so that they would be out of temptation's way. One way to use up some of these was to make pancakes.

In France, Shrove Tuesday is known as Mardi Gras – translated as Fat Tuesday. Originally a catholic holiday, Mardi Gras marks the eve of Lent and like us, their custom was a period of abstinence from indulgent food. It still holds religious significance for many. Their tradition to use up the butter, milk and eggs is also to make pancakes - or as they call them, Crêpes.

Historically, people dressed up for Mardi Gras to join in the revelry and excitement of the day. Nowadays, children often dress up to go to school and show off their outfits and there are carnivals all over France.

We asked Jean-Luc Morisset, a keen baker from our Twin Village, Artannes sur Indre, for his recipe for making traditional crêpes. Here it is:

#### SWEET CRÊPES RECIPE

Makes about 15 large crêpes

250 g plain flour 5 g salt

3 large eggs 400 ml milk

30 g sugar 40 g melted butter

- 1. Put dry ingredients into a large bowl and stir
- Add the eggs and half the milk and whisk until combined
- 3. Add the rest of the milk and melted butter and stir. Leave to rest for at least 1 hour
- Warm your frying pan on the hob for a couple of minutes then brush base and sides with melted butter
- 5. Remove pan from heat and add batter. For a 20cm pan you will need about 3 tbsp or 45 50 ml batter and a 23 cm pan, about 4 tbs or 60 ml. Swirl the pan as you add the batter, working quickly to spread it evenly all way to the edges. Place the pan back on the heat
- 6. Cook the each crêpe until the edges are starting to brown and look a little crispy. Gently lift each crêpe and flip it over to cook the other side until you see brown caramelised spots
- 7. Have a go at tossing or tip out onto a plate and finish with your favourite topping.

If you don't fancy having a go yourself, The Twinning Association will be making crêpes with Jean-Luc's recipe and serving them in the Village Shop Café between 15:30 and 17:00 on Tuesday 4 March.

### BATHFORD CHURCH SCHOOL powered by the sun!

Children at Bathford Church School have helped support the school's theme of Sustainable Development following the installation of new solar panels on the school's roof during the October half-term of 2024. The children have learnt about the impact of people's actions on the environment and wanted to take some positive, practical action as caring, responsible global citizens.

We are pleased to say that this was at no direct cost to the school, courtesy of an initiative from Bath & West Community Energy (BWCE)\* and part-funded by a £500,000 grant through the South-West Local Solar Scheme. The school will benefit from lower-cost clean electricity generated by the sun for the next 25 years, which will reduce carbon emissions and make substantial savings to electricity bills, so more of the budget can be diverted to teaching and learning resources for children.
